Our PPIE initiative is pleased to announce a new major collaboration with the International Severe Acute Respiratory Infections Consortium (ISARIC)! Over the next five years, we will work with ISARIC to bring the patient voice into infectious disease research while continuing our work to make research more relevant and beneficial to the community in Karachi.

ISARIC

The consortium brings together global partners with an aim to improve patients' care before, during and after infectious disease pandemics. Over 10 years, ISARIC and partners have carried out research in COVID-19, dengue, Ebola, Lassa fever, monkeypox and plague. Four regional Hubs lead this global work - The South Asia Hub is located in Pakistan and led by our own Prof Madiha Hashmi, the head of the Critical Care Research Group (CCRG).

Our coordinators and members have come up with an ambitious 5-year plan in collaboration with ISARIC to make sure infectious disease research is acceptable, relevant and impactful for the South Asian public. The plan focuses particularly on dengue and infectious encephalitis (swelling of the brain) that are significant health issues in Pakistan. This collaboration allows our group to work with multiple international teams to promote the community voice globally.



CREDO COURSE

Our PPIE group contributed significantly to the 1st Clinical Research During Outbreaks (CREDO) Training course organized by ISARIC and CCRG. One of our inspirational public members, Shehla, talked about community perspectives of COVID-19 while our coordinators Arishay and Prof Nikhat presented about the value of PPIE. Another one of our coordinators, Timo, acted as course faculty and helped the scholars come up with high-quality research proposals that incorporate meaningful public engagement.


